


Reading to/or With Your Child for at least 15 minutes a day. Research shows





If a person doesn't own mocs, can't wear mocs, or perhaps their Tribe didn't wear mocs, they may wear a Turquoise Awareness Ribbon instead. Even easier, the event takes place where you are, where you're going and where you live. Rock Your Mocs is a fun way to unify Native American, Aboriginal, First Nations, Alaskan Native, Indigenous Peoples globally through internet social media, participants post their photos for everyone to enjoy, sharing their stories.







Student Transition Support Plan

Students' capacity to navigate key transitions along their education pathway is vital to student success and connecting today's learning to tomorrow's career. Sagamok Education recognizes the importance of supporting students in transitioning through education levels and places a strong focus on helping students, staff, and parents with ensuring students are supported throughout educational transitions. The student support network has identified a number of activities throughout the year intended to support student transitions and help students to prepare for educational success and career entrance.

One of the over 30 activities we do to support student transitions, is the Career & Education Planning Series sessions for grades 9-12.

Education & Career Planning Youth Workshops Series

Students inevitably face many types of challenges throughout their academic careers, and we understand that there can be a degree of uncertainty when transitioning between education levels. A primary goal for the Student Support Network is to work together between all education levels to help minimize the impacts of those challenges to student success. This series of workshops is intended to help youth with creating an education plan that will lead you into your field of choice.

Are you a youth who is:

- · unsure of what career field to get into
- unsure of what courses would be needed for that field
- not sure how your high school courses lead you into college/university, or employment
- finding it difficult to stay motivated to graduate grade 12 because unsure of what to do after high school

Sometimes, some of the challenges or barriers can be broken down with a little bit of planning, and knowing what to expect. We're here to help!

Re-Engagement Program at WALC

The Re-engagement Program is for mature individuals over 18 who have not been successful in a regular secondary school.

Students earn various credits they require to complete their OSSD, including Co-op credits for students who may have full time jobs. Students are also able to receive maturity credits, and Grade 9 & 10 credits much more quickly. Last year the Re-engagement program supported our two in-class courses, Environmental Science and Tourism & Hospitality which were very successful.

This academic vear Reour engagement teacher is Alain Sauve. He has an educational background in Business, Computers and Special Education and has been teaching for twenty years. Mr. Sauve taught the Civics and Careers at AOK this past summer.







The Volunteer Process

Below are the following steps you should be aware of before starting your community involvement activities:

STEP 1 – Planning and Approval

Learn more about the community involvement requirement by talking to your teachers, the Guidance Office or visit https://www.rainbowschools.ca/programs/secondary-education/volunteer-hours/

Get a copy of the Student Volunteer Activity Sheet which can be downloaded. Review RDSB's Community Involvement Policy and eligible volunteer activities.

Have your community involvement activity choices approved by a school official.

STEP 2 – Taking Action and Recording Your Activities

Complete your required volunteer activities.

Ensure all volunteer activities & hours are recorded, dated and signed by you, your parents if under the age of 18 and your volunteer supervisor.

Verify your hours and activities.

STEP 3 – Submitting and Checking

Submit your Student Volunteer Activity Sheet to your guidance counsellor or to the WALC teacher.

Check your next report card or credit counselling summary sheet to see that your community involvement activities have been updated and checked as complete.



Secondary students are required to complete 40 hours of community service before graduation

Volunteering should be looked at as an opportunity to explore career options, prepare for the workforce, gain work experience and develop skills, discover your strengths, build confidence.

Find eligible volunteer activities that match your personality, interests and skills.


Make sure that your volunteer activities meet ministry and school guidelines.

Send your cover letter, résumé and police background check (sometimes required) to prospective community sponsors/volunteer supervisors.


